TIPS FROM HOMESCHOOLERS

Gisborne homeschoolers may be more used to being at home but they too are being affected by lockdown as they transition from homeschooling to isolation schooling. Reporter Kim Parkinson talks to some Gisborne homeschoolers to find out how they are adapting to the Covid-19 lockdown and gets some advice for parents trying to keep up their children's education within the confines of their own homes.

One Gisborne homeschooler Larisa Hockey said that while her children are more used to being at home, they will still miss their friends and activities.

"All our regular group activities like Tonui Colab, swimming, drama, art, volleyball, and general get-togethers are cancelled."

Larisa and husband John have been homeschooling their children for eight years.

"I homeschooled my son Daniel for seven years but he is now at Gisborne Boys' High School and doing well.

"We chose to homeschool for flexibility, freedom and fun and have seen great benefits for the kids' learning and our family connection.

"The Gisborne Homeschool Group is a great source of support and opportunities."

As Gisborne enters a period of lockdown

some parents are wondering if they should attempt to homeschool their children.

Mrs Hockey said her biggest piece of advice would be to "relax".

"Don't expect too much of yourself as a teacher or your children as students," she said.

"This is a great opportunity to build great family connections and that won't happen if everyone is stressed.

"Routines will be helpful — get everyone together to work out a schedule for helping around the home, exercise, quiet times, school work times, and build in lots of free time.

"Use screen time as a tool — time-out for yourself and rewards for the kids for completing other parts of the schedule.

"Agree on time limits as a family but you might find you need to allow more than you normally would and that's OK, as screens will be useful too in connecting kids with their friends and whanau."

As far as schoolwork goes, she said to just do what you can.

"Support children with the work the schools have given them, provide more if they are interested, but don't stress about it."

"A few weeks of lower levels of output won't affect them too much."

"Kids are likely to react differently to you as a parent than their teacher so try not to let schoolwork become a battleground."

"Find out what motivates them — star charts, food, screen time, games with you?"

"This is also a great opportunity to get them into subjects or projects they are interested in, like learning te reo or another language, creating art, learning computer coding, writing a book and creating illustrations for it."

"Families who normally go to school are being thrown into the deep end without any preparation, so this will be challenging," she said.

"Focusing on building family relationships

will be the key to not just surviving but thriving through this experience."

Another member of The Gisborne Homeschool Group Josh O'Neill said parents should follow their child's lead and let them focus on something they love.

"This is also an extremely rare chance to bond with your kids," he said.

Josh and his wife Natacha have been homeschooling their 12-year-old son Tahī for seven years and their eight-year-old son Miro for three. Four-year-old daughter, Kuihi, will start when she is six.

"We live on a small organic farm close to Gisborne and this provides a great environment for them to learn in."

"We all work closely together throughout the day and this has become the backbone of their homeschooling, along with regular things like maths, reading and swimming."

Natacha is the main teacher when Josh is working away from home or on big projects on the farm.

A huge part of their learning revolves around farm projects such as gardening, animal husbandry and tree planting.

"We love spending time with our kids and watching them discover new things every day."

"It's also great to have cheap labour on tap. As they grow older, they become responsible for certain aspects of the farm."

"We love watching them grow and every day we are more satisfied that we made the right choice to homeschool."

"We have learned to teach at the child's own pace and are able to adapt to their style of learning."

"We also learn new things along side them (dinosaurs were a favourite subject for the first few years of homeschooling) and we get to teach them skills that we think are important like cooking, cleaning, helping with doing the dishes, gardening and helping with firewood."

Right now, Tahī's big project is to replicate a Daft Punk song on his loopstation and Miro is copying an artwork from an old children's picture book. They spend a huge amount of their time on things they are passionate about, like electronic music and drawing.

Mr O'Neill said Lego would have to be the foundation of their earlier education.

Neuroscience educator and director of X-Factor Education Nathan Wallis encourages parents to use this time of lockdown to promote creativity.

"Our school curriculum doesn't tend to

value creativity enough, in my opinion," he said on a video posted on his Facebook page.

Mr Wallis wants to encourage parents to focus the curriculum on the arts over the next four weeks.

"From a neuroscience point of view, creativity — dance, music and all those types of things — are right-brain things that support left-brain function," he said.

"Get the kids singing, get the kids dancing. Maybe now is the time to learn to play that guitar that's been sitting in the corner of the lounge all that time."

"You can look it up on YouTube. Learn things with your child, alongside them."

"The kids are going to remember these four weeks for the rest of their lives so this could be the time when they learned to play the guitar or the equivalent."

"So I'd just encourage you to be creative and embrace the arts."

His advice to parents was not to be too quick to set up a home school.

"Our country is in a crisis, and we are all stressed and tired. Stressed adults cannot teach stressed children. It is a neurobiological impossibility."

"Try focusing on connections and feelings of safety."

A funny thing happened on the way to the theatre

*Shortly after Belinda Campbell returned from Australia to direct Musical Theatre Gisborne's production of *The Addams Family* the lockdown was announced — and she now has time to talk to Mark Peters about her life and love of theatre.*

Exile in her hometown hasn't worked out too badly for Melbourne theatre company Wit Incorporated artistic director Belinda Campbell. Now back in Gisborne, Belinda is staying at her parents' home which is walking distance from the beach — but for now, as for everyone, her plans are on hold.

Belinda returned to Gisborne last month to direct Musical Theatre Gisborne's (MTG) now postponed production of *The Addams Family*.

"When I landed I went straight to rehearsals and did two that weekend. Then the advice given was if you had been in the country for less than two weeks, go into isolation — so I did. A few days later the lockdown was announced."

Plans to travel to Europe after *The Addams Family* performance season and before she returns to Melbourne, where much of her livelihood is in teaching drama to children, are also on hold.

"Part of my travel plans included going to Italy for a wedding, but that has been cancelled. The rest was part visiting family and part travel — all cancelled now."

Staying in Gisborne seemed like a good idea after Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern announced the lockdown though, says Belinda.

"I appreciate what she is doing. It's comforting to know she's taking the right steps at the right time."

"I try to keep up with the news in Australia but it's very confusing. I have friends in Australia who rely on Jacinda for news."

"It definitely feels safer to be here."

Now back in Gisborne, Belinda is impressed with the region's thriving art community. Cast and crew involved with Musical Theatre Gisborne's planned production are one of the hardest working groups she has worked with, she says.

Prior to her return, the cast worked on singing and dance routines while others were busy with costume-making, set and lighting design.

"The cast had their scripts down before

I got here. We'll have to go back to more intense rehearsals at the right time. Meanwhile, people are quietly working away at things such as costumes where they can."

Belinda brought with her a lifetime passion for theatre and a flexible style of direction.

"My principles and style, for the most part, remain the same, but I think you need to be adaptable and flexible to suit the show and the group. You have to be agile."

"What I really enjoy is working with the actors on character, their motivations, what makes them tick, and bringing the story to life in that way."

"I often reference 'animal work' — getting the actors to pick an animal for their character, which I think helps get people out of their heads and into their bodies."

Although actors might be familiar with *The Addams Family* TV show characters, Belinda told her cast she didn't want them to try to replicate what they had seen in the comedy series.

"I said 'have a look at your character backstory, work out what they want, and you'll act more authentically'. None of us know everything, I'd much rather use all the brains in the room. Let's use everyone's instincts. A person will do something that will inspire something from someone else. That's the only way I want to work when I'm in an acting role."

Born and raised in Gisborne, Belinda attended St Mary's Catholic School then Campion College. Her parents Jim and Teresa Campbell were, and still are, closely involved with musical theatre.

"It's definitely a family activity," says Belinda.

"We all really enjoy theatre. They couldn't keep me away from it. I've always been a bit of an entertainer. Theatre is mesmerising."

As a four year old she was banned from attending theatre briefly because she found a love scene in the musical *South Pacific* hilarious. Having got past that she landed, in later years, a romantic part as the border collie Jess in a Gisborne Operatic Society production of *Footrot Flats*.

School-age years can be a time of struggle in all people's lives but for Belinda theatre was her haven.

"Drama at school was hugely helpful for me. It made difficult times more bearable. The drama room was my safe place."

She also worked in one capacity or another with all of Gisborne's theatres at the time.

"If I wasn't cast in a role I'd be helping backstage. And when doing neither of those, I'd be immersed in Young Unity, or speech and drama classes, or school plays."

Roles in Gisborne's community theatre productions included a part as a field mouse in a Unity Theatre production of *Toad of Toad Hall* and as Kathy Cratchit in a Gisborne Theatre Arts production of *Scrooge*.

"The last show I was in here was *Playhouse Creatures*. I wasn't going to be here for it at first. I had applied for a place in a drama course in Napier but two weeks before I was due to attend, they cancelled the course."

She knew *Playhouse Creatures* was coming up, so she hurried to auditions and landed the part of saucy Nell Gwynn, one of the first actresses on the English stage.

Set in England in 1669, at a time when theatres reopened after 17 years of Puritan suppression, Nell Gwynn was among the first English actresses to appear on stage.

Despite her immersion in drama, when asked in her last year at school what she wanted to do after graduation, Belinda found she didn't know. She didn't know if she should pursue a career in the financially-tenuous world of theatre, but she didn't want to do anything else.

"Luckily, I have wonderful parents who made me feel like I could do anything," she says.

"I was aware it was going to be hard, but this is the only thing I could think of that I wanted to do."

After graduating from NASDA (National Academy of Singing and Dramatic Art) in Christchurch in 2008, Belinda later headed for Australia.

"I had a lot of friends in Australia. I didn't think I'd stay there but I got interested in

the Melbourne theatre scene, so living there happened by accident."

She has taken on small parts in film and TV productions, and commercials help pay the bills, but live theatre has a magic that is hard to define, she says.

"There's something magic about breathing the same air as actors in performance. No two performances are ever going to be the same. Each one is a unique shared experience for the performers and the audience."

"Theatre connects us with other people. Theatre foyers should be as important as designing the theatre itself. It's where people can connect."

"I want to see audiences hang around and discuss ideas and the shared experience. People are more inclined to chat once they've shared the experience of a show."

In 2014 Belinda started up Wit Incorporated. The company has outlived the life expectancy of most theatres, she says. The challenge with working in independent theatre is that cast and crew often deal with new ideas, and no money. Getting funding and audiences to attend can also be a challenge.

Community and independent, professional theatre offer an incubator where new, exciting ideas are born.

"What I see in independent theatre is usually more exciting than commercial theatre. Independent theatre is driven more by the need to say something or explore an idea, to challenge the status quo — it's often more experimental, more provocative than commercial theatre."

Now with life on hold in Gisborne, Belinda has chosen to look at this time as a gift. Having written and had published a couple of children's plays, she is using her time here to write, consider the future and practise tai chi, a martial art-based form of meditation in movement.

"It's so lovely to be back here," she says. "It's a difficult time but I'm feeling better about it now. I'm reminded what a wonderful community we have here. It's such a beautiful place to be in."

GOOD FOR THE SOUL

According to the garden centres, everyone went nuts over buying seeds and plants before the lockdown. Many were veteran gardeners making sure they had enough supplies to keep them happy for the next month but some were newbies who will soon discover the joys of growing their own fruit and vegetables. Wherever you have room for bulbs, soil preparation will make all the difference, giving the bulbs the best possible start. Insect pests such as aphids, thrips and whiteflies feed on sweet and sugary plant sap. This not only depletes the plants of important nutrients, but can cause leaves to permanently discolour and distort and sap sucking insects can also transmit plant viruses.

If that wasn't enough, these insects excrete a substance called honeydew, which the disease sooty mould can then grow on (which appears as a dark grey or black ash like covering over leaves and stems). Honeydew will also attract ants, which you can see travelling up and down plant stems.

In addition to causing mottled leaves and

poor plant health, sap sucking pests like mites can also cause spider like webbing as populations increase.

Chewing insects like caterpillars can rapidly eat through lots of foliage, stems, buds and flowers.

Ornamental shrubs and trees like camellias, azaleas, gardenias, hibiscus, fuchsias and roses as well as annual flowers like petunias, violas, marigolds and calendulas can be susceptible to a range of damaging sucking and chewing insects pests. Sometimes it's hard to know which insect pest is causing the damage so it's handy to have a spray which will control a range of both chewing and sucking insect pests.

Easy one-pan pork

INGREDIENTS:

4 large pork chops, rind and fat removed
2 granny smith apples, peeled, cored and thickly sliced in rounds
4 medium-sized agria potatoes, washed and thickly sliced
2 onions thinly sliced
1 cup of apple juice
6-8 prunes
4 baby courgettes, thickly sliced
Salt, pepper and oregano to taste

METHOD:

Brown pork chops but do not cook through. Remove from pan.
Brown onions.
In a large ovenproof dish, layer chops, sliced potatoes, sliced apple.

Dot with prunes and courgettes.
Pour apple juice over the ingredients and season.
Cover and cook slowly for 1-1½ hours.

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Just cruisin'

Andy Searle continues the story of his family's wonderful South Pacific cruise.

One of the idyllic white sand beaches we visited.

The first three days of the cruise were at sea getting to the islands we were going to visit. We were constantly moving, day and night, so we soon got used to the motion.

One thing to remember is that there is no need for cash on the ship, although you may want some for the islands — there are ATMs on board.

All on-board sales are done via a swipe-card (which is also the key to your cabin) so you want to make sure you hold on to it the whole time.

That's why you can always spot a fellow-cruiser by the lanyard holding their cards around their necks.

It really is the easiest way to carry it and as I had a collection of lanyards from various "gigs", it pained me to pay A\$6 each on board for a fancy bit of string (even more for my wife's one because she wanted one with some "bling". I'll bring my own next time, I mentally noted.

Cards can be loaded with dollar values on them (we received a \$300 credit as part of the cruise package) and also the option to go into debit. This was NOT the option we chose for our kids' cards!

If you really want to, you could get away without any additional spending on board as there are at least 16 different places to eat at for free as well as juice, water, tea and coffee (not barista), all at no charge.

However, the ease of charging extra items to the card makes it simple to get any "necessities", like a flat white or alcohol.

You can purchase an alcohol add-on package. But we are not big drinkers and if

we had paid for it I would have seen it as a challenge to get my money's worth — I guess the next day I could have claimed seasickness ...

There was so much to do on the ship that even after nine days, we were still finding things we had not seen before.

For the kids, there are great age-appropriate free "Kids' Clubs" where you can just drop them off and know they are being looked after. There's a beauty spa, full gym, massage, a casino, sports bar and so much more, including an "adults-only pool area".

For entertainment there is a games arcade, basketball court, minigolf, outdoor movie theatre as well as the "Pharaoh's Palace" live theatre which had a different show each night — they were some of the most professional I have seen.

There is also the comedy club featuring guest comedians — an 8.30pm PG show and then a late-night R18 session.

And for the workaholics or those who can't "unplug" there is on board wi-fi, although I think they charge per kilometre for the signal to get back to

Australia — ouch!

I received an \$80 birthday voucher from the spa (so it is worth mentioning it if you are having a birthday), which I then topped up for a "stress-buster massage" — not that I was very stressed on a Pacific cruise. It was great, until they started recommending certain products I should buy to help my muscles relax. I guess it is all about the up-sell.


